## Sincere Life's "Write of Passage" Album Review

These days' a rappers image and marketability mean much more than his talent. According to current industry standards, Sincere Life's *Write of Passage* EP will probably never go platinum, but this emcee's talent is truly priceless.

If your fed up with the watered down and commercialized state of Hip-Hop, this album is a dedication to you. *Write of Passage* is the antithesis to the over-saturated, uninspired, repetitive sound of mainstream rap music. "I know your necklace froze but I'm colder" or "I'm clocking in instead of putting my work on scale" let you know that Sincere is well aware of the images most people prefer in the music industry. Unlike many of his peers, Sincere appreciates the value of words. "I love being open and transparent on a track. I think the majority of Hip-Hop neglects that honesty, and its something the people need to hear" says Sincere.

Write of Passage has solid yet simple production. The best part of this EP is Sincere Life, and rightfully so. The standout tracks are Write of Passage, Feel Me, The Zone, White Grape White Owls, and Favorite. The title track Write of Passage is my personal favorite, and is the perfect song for a video. In the intro, Sincere says, "This is that music they don't appreciate" and I completely agree. Sincere expressed, "The majority of people don't want a true emcee. They won't appreciate the music that inspires or teaches. Everything is the same, people only want banging beats and ignorant lyrics".

Sincere's message is clear on *Write of Passage*. He is trying to bring it back to the true essence of Hip-Hop. Sincere recites bars like "The radio almost make me wanna be done with rap/ But then every verse that I write make me feel like I bring her back". These particular lyrics made me wonder if Sincere had actually considered giving up on music. Sincere stated, "I try not to let it get me to the point of quitting. I'd like to believe that even if I don't get the worldwide acclaim, I will still write music for me and those who want to listen. That is what brings me back".

Sincere said the main goal of this *EP* is to create a buzz for his new album *L.I.F.E. L.I.F.E* is an acronym that stands for; Lyrics Interpreting Free Emotions. This acronym is the perfect description of his music said

Sincere. "I try to write so the emotions I share in my music can be related too". Sincere's new album L.I.F.E is scheduled to be released in the fall of 2013.

In our interview, I asked Sincere if he felt like he gets over looked as an artist. His response was "If I do get over looked that's no one's fault but my own. It just means I still have a shot to make someone else a believer. I can't put the blame on anyone but myself". I told you, Sincere Life is not your typical rapper.
